Education in the colonial apartheid era

- Education in the colonial apartheid era
- Higher education was not pertinent to democratic South African development
- Higher education in south Africa was engineered to support the colonial and apartheid capitalism
- Black majority excluded from the cultivation of minds,
- Its main focus was on social sciences and economics

Decolonization of the Social Work Education System

- Means the removal of colonial elements
- Adoption of African Social Work intervention theories and strategies
- Institutions of higher learning as the centres of knowledge production
- indigenous modes of knowledge production and knowledge systems.

The gaps SW education system and practice

- Interventions adopted in higher institutions of learning do not respond to societal needs
- These approaches do not recognise cultural practices and indigenous knowledge
- They are Eurocentric in nature
- The ABCD approached highly being adopted as a strategy
- Government uses a needs based approach
- Social Workers' roles are being reduced

Recommendations

- Afrocentric approach must be adopted
- Sustainable intervention approaches and strategies
- An approach that will be accommodated by institutions of higher learning, the government and NGOs.
- Underpaid professionals
